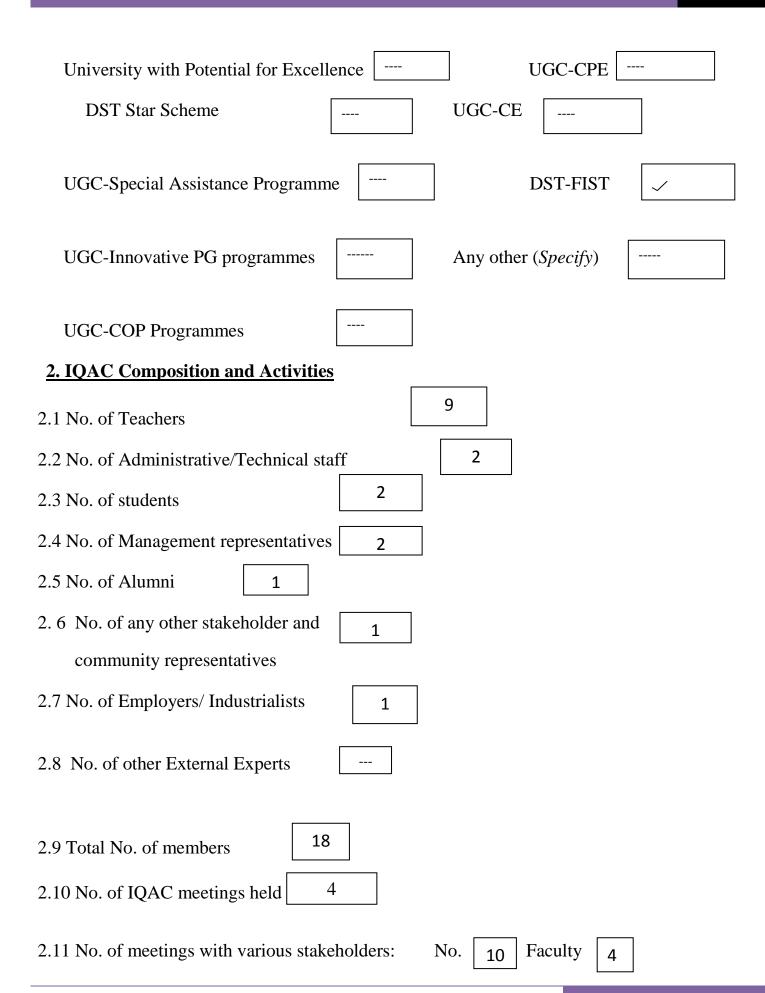

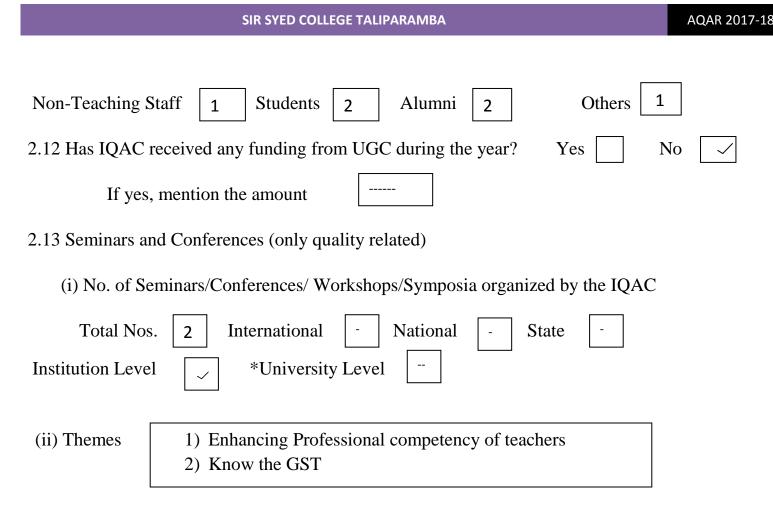

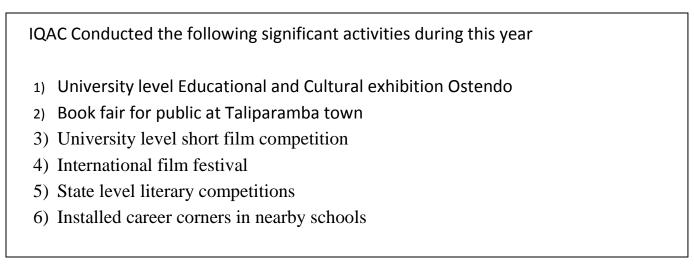

A library management software package "BOOKMAGIC" with SQL server as back engine had been installed in 2003. The features are OPAC, Management module, Circulation module, Stock verification, View status, Barcode, etc.

<u>OPAC (Online Public Access Cataloue:</u> OPAC module offers a wide range of flexibility by using different search options. (By author, title, subject, keyword, Publisher, Call number, etc.). The students can see the holdings of the library and easily locate the documents they want.

<u>VIEW STATUS</u>: View status is used to view the status of the library resources and borrowers. The students can check whether the needed documents are available in the library or loaned out.

<u>Computerized circulation with barcoding technology</u> All the books in the library and identity cards of the students have been barcoded. By using the orbit scanner the students can get the books issued and returned within a few seconds.

<u>Electronic Journals</u> Access to more than 6000 electronic journals (Full text) and ebooks are being provided to staff and students under NLIST programme (Abridged form of INFLIBNET, exclusively designed for college libraries) of UGC. Teachers, Research Scholars and Post Graduate students have been provided individual username and password so that they can use this facility in the campus as well as outside.





f The three year undergraduate programme is divided into 6 semesters, each semester consisting of a minimum of 90 working days, inclusive of examinations, distributed over five-day academic weeks. The duration of the odd semesters will be from June to October and even semesters from December to April.
