Report of Field Trip to Ootty – IV sem B.Com

On **08/10/2023**, , seventy-two IV semester B.Com students, accompanied by three teachers, Dr. Shanavas S M, Muhammed Salih C, and Ramseena Azeez, embarked on an educational field trip to a Tea Factory ,Chocolate Factory and Grape farm (Agro tourism) as part of their curriculum. The primary objective of the trip was to provide students with practical knowledge and insights into the operations and functioning of manufacturing units in the tea, agro-farm tourism etc.

The day began with a visit to Tea Factory, where students were introduced to the history and operations of tea production. They observed firsthand the intricate processes involved, including plucking, withering, rolling, fermenting, drying, and sorting of tea leaves. Quality control measures and packaging techniques were also highlighted, emphasizing the importance of maintaining standards in production and distribution.

In the afternoon, the group proceeded to Chocolate Factory, where they learned about the journey of cocoa beans from sourcing to the final chocolate product. The students witnessed the stages of roasting, grinding, refining, conching, tempering, molding, and packaging. Discussions with factory experts provided insights into the technological advancements and quality assurance practices implemented in chocolate manufacturing.

Throughout the day, interactive sessions and demonstrations allowed students to engage directly with industry professionals, enhancing their understanding of real-world applications of business concepts studied in their coursework. The trip concluded with a feedback session where students expressed appreciation for the practical exposure gained and highlighted the relevance of such experiences in their academic and career pursuits.

In summary, the field trip was successful in achieving its objectives of updating practical knowledge and providing valuable industry experience to the B.Com students. It underscored the importance of bridging theoretical learning with practical application, preparing students for future roles in the dynamic business environment of the food and beverage sector.

This museum has been set in fond memory of the great freedom fighter, Bhimrao Ramji Ambedkar. The museum houses a rich collection of items that Dr. Ambedkar used from his childhood until his death. We spent a quality time at the museum by watching the life of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar, the architect of India's constitution, a great social reformer, a humanist, a champion of the downtrodden and a proponent of national unity. After that we moved to the prestigious and iconic FILM AND TELEVISION INSTITUTE OF INDIA. The institute was set up by the Government of India in 1960, in the premises of the erstwhile Prabhat Studios in Pune.

The FTII Campus currently stands on the grounds of the erstwhile Prabhat Studio. Prabhat Studio was a pioneer in the business of filmmaking and shifted to Pune from Kolhapur in 1933. The archaic studios of the time, which were the production grounds for the films of Prabhat are still present and are being used at FTII. The old Studios of Prabhat are now heritage structures and FTII students continue to work at the world's oldest functioning film shooting studios. We were amazed by the studio setups in the institute. Our Guide Sachin Shinde explained to us the

functioning and setups of various studios. We seen places like Shantaram Pond,

It is a tank-like structure that had been constructed by the Prabhat Film Company to facilitate the filming of various scenes.

After spending a day at FTII, we went to Pune's iconic landmark, The Shaniwar Wada, it is a historical fortification in the city of Pune, Built in 1732, it was the seat of the Peshwas of the Maratha Empire until 1818. The palace is famous for its architectural beauty, rich history, and the tragic story of the Peshwa family. We only had less time to spend at the fort because we need to head back to Mumbai tomorrow. So we quickly headed back to our bus and enjoyed our travel to Mumbai, the city of dreams.


10/12/2023

ALIGARH MUSLIM UNIVERSITY VISIT

On February 3rd, 2024, a group of 42 students along with Asst. Prof. Fairroosa K K and Asst. Prof. Muneer CP had visited Aligarh Muslim University, Uttar Pradesh. They had an interactive sessions with the faculties Dr. Haris Kunari, Dr. Mohammad Shuaib, Dr. Mohammad Rafi Alam, and others and thereby visited laboratories with various spectroscopic instruments. Aligarh Muslim University, with a focus on science and technology, likely has X-ray diffraction (XRD) facilities available for researchers and students and had an interactive session about the methods followed up to use the instrument. The spectroscopic laboratory were equipped with various sophisticated spectroscopic instruments including UV-Visible spectrophotometers, Fourier-transform infrared (FTIR) spectrometers, nuclear magnetic resonance (NMR) spectrometers, mass spectrometers, Raman spectrometers, and perhaps X-ray fluorescence (XRF) or X-ray photoelectron spectroscopy (XPS) instruments. The University may also offer spectroscopy-related courses and training programs as part of its academic curriculum, allowing students to gain theoretical knowledge and practical skills in spectroscopic methods. In the undergraduate physics laboratory, they had an opportunity to assist the physics lecturers with basic and important physics experiments like Newton's ring and diffraction grating.

TOUR REPORT

INTRODUCTION

Finally by 9 pm we reached back to our hotel and had a long dinner.

- Challenging the height by gliding.


VENUE: NYINGMAPA BUDDHIST MONASTERY

It was the 2nd day of our industrial visit. The climate was so cold and for us waking up in the morning became a task. It was our last day in Manali. By 8am we had our breakfast and we started our journey by walk. The street was not much crowded and noisy. We walked so long and we reached first destination point Himalayan Nyingmapa Buddhist monastery Himachal Pradesh at 10 am. Which was one of the most famous monasteries situated in North India. They will not allow us to take pictures unless it is paid. The chirping of birds made the environment so calm. Then we moved to Hadimba Devi temple at 11.30.



VENUE: HIDIMBA DEVI TEMPLE

Hidimba Devi temple is the oldest cave temple situated in old Manali. It is surrounded by cedar forest called Dungri Van Vihar at the foot of Himalayas. The peeping sun made us warm. The horns of the vehicle didn't disturb us because the scenery of Himalayas and the walk through the way surrounded by the coniferous trees was so good. Long trekking towards the temple made us exhausted but the experience was unforgettable. The temple was not much crowded. We took photos in the traditional attire of Manali and took a ride in yak. At 1 pm we moved to our next destination Dungri van Vihar forest park.



VENUE :DUNGRI VAN VIHAR MANALI SANCTUARY PARK

Located in the heart of the mall road, Van Vihar is a municipality run public garden. The park was much famous for the deodorant trees. Different species of birds were observed, which was very different and new to us. Kalij pheasant, Koklass pheasant, Himalayan monal (male & female), Chukar partridge, Bar-headed Goose, Cheer Pheasant (male & female) etc were some of the birds. Each one was different by its color, physical appearance and their body has more feathers than our local birds, it may be an

adaptation to resist extreme cold climate. vocal change was observed ,food habit, flying mode was different from each other. These all were very new to us. We had a chance to see and experience all these due to this IV. We continued our walk through Mall road.

Mall road was crowded .The cold was not extreme at that time. There was wide variety of street foods. We tasted some of them and purchased some stationery items and moved back to Hotel Naveen.



VENUE : BEAS RIVER ,KULU

We had chicken biryani for our lunch at 2.40 pm. At 3.30 pm, we checked out from hotel and went for river rafting in Kulu. It is seen as an ideal place for both amature and mature rafters. We reached there by 4:30pm, then split into two groups and began our journey in two rafts. Few of us was interested in paragliding and they move to the spot by jeep. The Beas River is a river in north India. The river originates from the Himalayas in central Himachal Pradesh, and flows for some 470 Kilometres (290 mi) to the Sutlej River in Punjab. VENUE: JNU

From our room , we went to JNU. It is a major public research university located in New Delhi, the capital of India. It was established in 1969 and named after India's first Prime Minister, Jawaharlal Nehru. This university is well known for applied science and social science research. It is well connected from the three main railway stations, namely New Delhi, Delhi, and Nizamuddin Railway Stations, as well as the interstate bus terminus. In short, JNU is highly accessible from any part of the world. It is about in 1 hour away from our room. It has an area of about 1000 acres and has a long-paved walk, and we were tired of the long walk. The campus was built in ecofriendly. It is one of the most visible instances of biomimicry in contemporary architecture. The temple is quite different from other Indian spiritual sites. It is open to everyone and encompasses all religions. There are staff members who will give you information about the story behind it. The temple is devoted to the Bahai faith. Anyone is free to pray inside as long as they want. From there, we got an opportunity to mingle with people of different cultures. The temple offered a peaceful and refreshing experience. The vast, lush green garden was another mesmerizing sight at the Lotus temple.



VENUE:INDIA GATE

After Lotus Temple visit ,we moved ahead to India Gate.We reached there by 3:30pm .But unfortunately India Gate was closed due to Republic Day parade Practice.We had our lunch at near India Gate.We left there by 4:00 pm.

VENUE:JAMA MASJID

It was our final destination of the day.we reached there around 5:30 pm.Jama Masjid was built by Mughal emperor Shahjahan between 1644 and 1656 at a cost of 1 million rupees. It is the largest mosque in India and one of the three major mosques in the world.Jama masjid street is one of the busiest and most commercialized streets in Delhi. It is famous for a wide range of street foods. We tasted some of them for the first time and explored the streets.Around 9:00 o clock we returned to our room by the means of delhi metro.It was an underground metro transportation which was a new experience to us.

The fine details of the sky reaching tower and the ancientness of the complex make Qutab Minar an incredible attraction. Qutab Minar was also attractive in its natural beauty. Here we were able to see many creatures like squirrels, parrots, mynas, etc. that are becoming extinct in our

locality. Gardening is also well maintained in Qutab minar. We headed to our next destination after the spectacular view at 6.30



VENUE:SAROJINI MARKET

We reached Delhi local market at 7pm. Streets and markets are the places to interact with natives and to understand more about the place. Sarojini market gave each one of us a new exposure to different situations. We walked down the streets in groups. No photo ever does justice to the Taj. It has to be seen. Although in some parts, we noticed that original beauty of the Taj mahal was fading away. Its white coloured marbles were turning yellow. The shining white colour of Taj mahal was faded due to severe air pollution which in turn causes acid rain . The high amount of carbon dioxide, oxides of nitrogen and sulphur etc. in the atmosphere react with the rain water and turn to acid rain. This acid reacts with marble and lost its shining . The Yamuna River is an integral part of the Taj mahal. But the river is also narrowed due to pollution. Hundreds of birds are flying over the river. That sight given us a peace, pleasure and joy.



VENUE : MEENA BAZAR

Around 6:10 pm we reach Meena bazar. It was crowded. The climate was not extreme at that time. There was wide variety of sweet food and peda. Some of us purchased some sweets. It was our last minute sweet shopping. After sightseeing we went back to the bus at 7:00 pm. we reached hotel for refreshment and had food at 8:00 pm. INDUSTRIAL VISIT TO ERNAKULAM-2023

INTRODUCTION

VENUE 1 : CUSAT

School of Marine Science, a unique institution of its kind in the country was established in 1938 as Department of Marine Biology and Fisheries under the erstwhile Travancore University to cater Marine Science education and research at national levels. The school is presently part of Cochin University of Science and Technology. The School consists of five departments in each discipline of marine science such as atmospheric Sciences, chemical Oceanography, physical oceanography, marine geology and geophysics and marine biology. The School is now celebrating its 80th year of existence.

We had our breakfast, and assembled in the first lab which was Wetland lab, we had a chance to see the PCR, Spectrometer, Mercury Analyser, DMA-1 etc. The researchers working there explained about each device; They also informed us about the new discovery of a species known to be *Stygartia keralensis*, which was isolated from Vadakara by their team, then we visited so many labs such as molecular biology lab, microbiology

lab, and came across various devices such as viscometer, weighing balance, flocculator, turbidity meter, texture analyser, muffle furnace and many more devices.



VENUE 2 :CMFRI

The ICAR-Central Marine Fisheries Research Institute was established by Government of India on February 3rd 1947 under the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and later it joined the ICAR family in 1967. During the course of over 75 years the Institute has emerged as a leading tropical marine fisheries research institute in the world. Since its inception, the CMFRI grew significantly in its size and stature and built up adequate research infrastructure and recruited qualified staff. During the first half of the five decades of its existence, the CMFRI devoted its research attention towards the estimation of marine fisheries landings and effort, taxonomy of marine organisms and the bio-economic characteristics of the exploited stocks of fin fish and shellfish.

Our next destination was CMFRI where we had our lunch and was welcomed by a lecture on mussel culture then we visited a large area surrounded with various type of machines such as PCR spectrometer etc ,Then we visited the aquarium with various types of fishes more than 800 then we went through the different labs and museums



VENUE 3 : MARINE DRIVE

Our next site was Marine Drive we had a long walk then by metro we reached to Lulu mall and had our dinner then we reached backed to our Hostel Aashirwad by metro at 11:00 pm

VENUE 4 : KUFOS

The Kerala University of Fisheries and Ocean Studies (KUFOS) is an autonomous public funded institution established on 20th November 2010. KUFOS is the first Fisheries University in the country. The headquarters of KUFOS is at Panangad, 12 km away from Kochi city, along NH-47. The University now has a sprawling campus of 67.83 acres in the headquarters at Panangad, 50 acres at Fisheries research station, Puduveypu situated at the Vypeen Island and extensive 10 acres off campus at Thiruvallom near Vizhinjam. The territorial jurisdiction of the University is extended to the whole of the State of Kerala and the Headquarters of the University is at Kochi in Ernakulam District.


